Message from the Mayor

The recent introduction to winter has caught many in Western Canada by surprise and has indeed halted, if not slowed, progress on harvest and many other construction sites. The high cost of these disruptions will be felt for months to come.

Immediately prior to the heavy snow, rain and cold temperatures we were entertained by a huge and successful fundraising event in favour of the Sport Court Project. A huge "thank you' to the creativity and efforts by the committee in this unique venture, in combination with a great outing in Toronto by our Saskatchewan Roughriders. As a community, we thank Brian Willms and Wilbar Farms for allowing the Saskatchewan champion bull "Escobar " to drop his greeting in the event.

After some initial delays, and the rain events in September, the South Memorial Road is almost complete. We are confident that October 9th should see this project completed with signage to follow.

It is discouraging that a portion of the speed bumps and STOP signs were removed on this past Saturday. These were put in place for safety of our children and residents in a critical area. This has prompted the need to install surveillance cameras in order to charge those who choose this form of protest.

After the road completion we will meet with the RM of Dundurn to establish the next phase to complete the access road for the shortest route to pavement.

The new street signs installed throughout the village have received many positive comments from residents as well as visitors. Thanks to our committee for this major community identity project. In conjunction with this project we have had to give addresses to various of our local asset locations for GPS identification necessary for Fire Department, EMO, Ambulance, and communication entities.

Our communication initiative is proving to be well appreciated by current and former Shields residents. This process will continue as we move closer in the evaluation of what a responsible social media effort can assist within our community and area.

A word on drainage concerns within the village has prompted not only identification of municipal areas, but has brought an awareness among and throughout private property locations. It might be a consideration to suggest that it is not acceptable to drain water from one property to another without consideration and communicating an agreement.

As we approach Thanksgiving, please travel safe and be sure to enjoy family and friends in sharing our good fortune for living in a great community, province and country.

Village Project Updates

Irrigation System Project Update

The project has not moved along as had hoped. The contractor commitment and availability was disappointing. Fred has recently met with two other contractors to quote on the irrigation project which has been deferred to Spring 2020.

Installation of the new village street signs is complete except for the portion of Memorial Drive that is under construction. What a difference! Positive comments received on the ability to read the signs both during the day and night and the professional look.

In the Spring of 2020, a traffic sign review throughout the village will occur to determine if additional signage is needed and if any need a refresh.



As part of the sign project, all street addresses within Shields were entered by Jessie into Saskatchewan Civic Address Registry (CAR). This registry, created through collaboration by Information Services Corporation (ISC) and Government of Saskatchewan, is to aid in emergency response planning and dispatch. More detailed information on CAR can be found at ISC.ca.

All Shields buildings and structures were assigned the following addresses:

All homes in Shields are required to have house numbers visible for emergency situations. Boat lot owners should place lot address on their building/lot for use in emergency situations as well.

Communication Project Update

The Project team is investigating a 'text messaging application' that would be used by the village to provide quick 'text' updates on operational activities to the residents of Shields. The technology must follow all anti-span legislative requirements for Canada and be cost effective for the village. A recommendation has now gone to Council for their October meeting; if approved, watch for instructions on how to sign up for the service coming soon!

Village Administration and Operations

Village Compost has Moved

The compost site has moved to the south end of Shields. This move is necessary due to the extremely wet conditions at the previous site which does not support the proper decomposition of all the material. Signage of the new location has been provided for your convenience. As always, no branches are allowed, the compost area is for *grass clippings and leaves only*.

Preparing for Fall and Winter

- Irrigation Water: Due to the recent weather the irrigation water is now shut down for the year. To help drain the lines it is a good idea to open your outside irrigation taps, but remember to CLOSE them before next spring BEFORE the irrigation water is turned on again.
- Seasonal Water Meters: A reminder to seasonal residents who need their meters removed for the winter to contact Fred at 306-492-7922 to arrange for the village to pull your meter and shut off your curb stop.
- > Winter Storage of Boat Docks and Lifts on the Shoreline
 - Ensure all equipment on the shoreline is tagged with owner name and contact number
 - Ensure equipment does not hinder residents walking along the shoreline
 - Any equipment not marked will be deemed abandoned and will be removed from the shoreline.

Blue Bins Returning

The blue recyclable bins are moving back near the mail boxes on Memorial Drive.

Potable Water System Disconnections

If you require your water curb stop shut off or your meter removed, Bylaw #6/07 addresses the fee for this service:

- If you are having your water shut off or turned on, a \$10 per event fee is charged if during normal work hours.
- If you require your meter removed and stored, *other than a seasonal service*, a \$25 charge for removal or install will apply.

It is very important that your curb stop is easy to locate. Please mark it to avoid a delay if your water needs to be shut off. There have been instances where the outside shut off was required to prevent flooding.

Outstanding Property Taxes

Reminder that outstanding property taxes are accumulating a penalty at the end of each month until they are paid in full.
