Mayor's Message

The Mayor and Councillors' 4-year terms were up at the end of July. This is a good time to summarize what Council has accomplishments over the past 4 years.

A survey was sent out to residents shortly after our term started (2021) and the information from this survey informed many of the decisions that we have made over the last 4 years. Council has had a very, very busy and productive term including the following initiatives:

- Completion of the Sportscourt and participation in fundraisers for sports court furniture.
- Moved the Administration office into the Village to allow for better access to Administrator.
- Completion of Fibre optics in the village in order to provide high speed internet.
- Building of a Social Gathering Place The HUB which was 73.33% funded through grants. Such a great spot, buzzing with activity and a great seasonal food service provider.
- Support of a very active children's program, adult exercise program, many events potlucks, Christmas party's, casino night, beer and burger night just to mention a few. Most of our programs and events have had a portion or 100% funded through various funding partners.
- Shields golf course continues to be a valuable and well-run asset of the village.
- Partnership between the RM and the village to build a new road providing a safe entrance/exit to our village connecting South Shields to highway 211. This project was 50% funded by a government grant.
- Development of a Marketing plan to promote the village and as a result the lots in south Mawson have started selling once again.(4 lots have sold).
- Updated the Official Community Plan and Zoning bylaw. Updated many other bylaws which were long overdue.
- Shields was the first municipality to get approval to use golf carts on municipal roads.
- Council has improved the working relationships with partners developed and agreed upon a long overdue
 operating agreement with Sunterra Developments. Recently held a very, very successful 1st ever for Shields
 collaborative Community Canada Day Celebration! This included the Town of Dundurn, Village of Shields,
 Village of Thode, RM of Dundurn and PSP Dundurn.
- No tax increases in 2024 even though inflation is high.
- We have announced recently our successful application for a grant worth 4.2 M which will allow all residents in Shields to have sewer service to their properties.
- We have completed a test project on the South Mawson Memorial Drive Roadway, applying SB-90 a new longer lasting dust control application.

It takes a great team to accomplish all that we have over the past 4 years. Thanks for the involvement of the Council, volunteers and staff. A job well done!!! I have thoroughly enjoyed working with the present Council and while some of us will start a second term, two of our Councillors who have been instrumental in the above accomplishments, Noel Tomlenovich and Jillian Gauthier have decided not to run for the next term and will be missed. We do welcome our two new councillors that will replace them: Chad Schmidt and Vanessa Bomboir.

What projects are coming up over the next few months?

- Over the next 3 months the site surveys for the sewer project will be completed along with an informational meeting for residents.
- To protect the village assets, operations will be installing security cameras outside our civic buildings.

We will continue to look at the needs of this community and do our best to follow through to make Shields the best place to live while still keeping it affordable. Enjoy the rest of your summer and stay safe.

Friendly reminder to all residents to please be respectful of equipment and property.

Green Space Committees

Just a reminder that we have a lot of elms in the village, both in our parks and on residents' property. There is a provincial pruning ban from April 1 to August 31 to reduce the spread of Dutch elm disease.

If you're planting new trees on your property, please consider only small to medium sized trees (NOT poplars or elms!), ideally species native to Saskatchewan (check with a local garden centre for advice). The many poplars in the community are ageing, and large branches are dying due to the droughts of the past few years - there is risk of them breaking off and hurting someone or damaging property. The massive roots cause damage to septic tanks, foundations and other underground infrastructure. The millions of elm seeds released each spring are not only annoying but take root wherever they can, often where they shouldn't grow (next to foundations, among trees and shrubs you planted, in eavestroughs, etc.).

We accept all cash donations. Etransfers can be sent to thefoodpantry20@gmail.com.

We also accept all dry goods that aren't expired. Staple items in our emergency hampers include pasta, pasta sauce, cereal, peanut butter, soup, and canned meats but we utilize everything that is donated.

We offer up to 4 emergency food hampers per year per household as well as holiday hampers for Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Eligible applicants must reside in Hanley, Dundurn, Shields, Thode, or the surrounding RM.

Docks and Storage Lots

Thank you to everyone who got their docks & lifts in the water before the June 30 deadline and to those who have marked their property with their names and phone numbers. Marking your docks & lifts saves time for Fred & myself when trying to track people down and ultimately saves money for the taxpayers. Docks & lifts that are still not in the water have been marked & recorded and owners have been notified for resolution. Fred, and the Green Space Committee have done an exceptionally good job in clearing and cleaning up Outlaws Ravine for new docks to be placed there. We currently have 4 residents planning & working in this area for one main dock to be placed with slips being added which greatly helps with shoreline space and availability. We continue to plan for the future realizing there are still a considerable number of lots still to be sold and a limited amount of shoreline to work with.

As a reminder to those that have storage lots in the north end to make sure that grass needs to be cut on your lot. We just want this area to be kept up and looking nice for the summer.

Saskatchewan Watershed

The Environment Ministry is working hard monitoring & preventing zebra mussels from entering Saskatchewan waters. To date none have been found. Prior to transporting your watercraft between lakes or provinces, please ensure your boat & trailer have been washed & drained. Drain plug must be removed while the watercraft is being transported. Failure to remove the drain plug & not stopping at a watercraft inspection station could result in a \$500 fine.

Important things to remember regarding zebra mussels as follows:

- extremely invasive
- · once established they are nearly impossible to get rid of
- can survive up to 18 days out of the water
- · can take over habitat for spawning fish, beaches, clog intake lines, and reduce water quality
- they are about the size of your fingernail
- yellowish in colour with brown zigzag lines across the upper shell
- one mature female mussel can lay up to 1 million eggs in one year

Bylaw Enforcement

The village has entered into an agreement with The Commissionaires regarding bylaw enforcement. We have received some complaints which relate to bylaw infractions, safety issues and as a village we are responsible for ensuring that bylaws are enforced. The commissionaires have been patrolling and reported that some of the most common violations are non licensed drivers on the roadways. Please be advised that drivers who do not hold a Class 7 learners license cannot operate golf carts on roadways. Please refer to the Golf Cart bylaw.

Please ensure all grass and weeds are cut in preparation for winter and that yards are neat and tidy as per the bylaw.

The animal control bylaw states that all pets must remain on leashes at all times. You may know that your pet is not a danger to anyone, but those unfamiliar with your pet may not be as confident. Please be mindful of your neighbors.

Please ensure that all rec vehicles and other items are located on your own property, and that nothing is impeding anyone's ability to navigate the roadways.

The speed on all village roads as per posted signage is 20 km per hour with the exception of Memorial Drive which is 30 km per hour.

Now that SB-90 has been applied along Memorial Drive please be mindful of your speed. Accidents can happen in a blink of an eye.
